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The intention of these production is to give a short introduction about sri lankan traditional dance in addition to the existing book-informations and to show the basic elements and forms of expression in a multimedial, interactive way. Dance lives from its movements and printmedia can show step by step-pictures, but are not able to give a clear impression of fluent transitions. It is clear, that the overview must be selective, according to the digital space, which is limited because of RAM and harddisc-capacity. Concerning the targets and requirements of a modern classroom and learning environment based on the recent brain-research and a constructivistic way of pedagogical thinking this productions refers to a special method a so-called cycle of experience, a sequence of 10 CD-ROMs, each showing a different aspect of sri lankan music cultures. This method refers to the self-responsibility of the learning person and offers flexible access to points of access, which are different in every memory. The technical requirement for the use of this material is a notebook-studio of ten laptops, which are arranged at ten so called stations, that means tables where beside of the laptop additional material can be arranged, like working papers and the task-descriptions the students have to accomplish. Two students can work in a cooperative way at every station. Everybody has a certain period, for example 12 hours, in which he can process all 10 stations and everybody is responsible to discuss with the others how to organise the work.

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
